Whole school Art Exhibition at the Guildhall – A message from Mrs Morton and Miss Grabham

Today we held our fifth annual public Art exhibition at the Guildhall in Chard. This year the work exhibited was inspired by the artwork of internationally renowned artist, Claude Monet and the children's art was in his impressionist style. As within each previous exhibition each child from the Early Years to Year 6 had the pleasure of producing a piece of work to be proudly displayed for the visitors to peruse.



The exhibition was opened by Councillor Gary Shortland (the Mayor of Chard) who enjoyed viewing the exhibition with two of the school Arts Councillors who shared their knowledge of Monet with him. In total thirteen Arts Councillors were at hand to explain their peers work with the visitors throughout the day and to impart their knowledge of Monet with those who attended the exhibition.

Swapping of collectable cards and stickers (Pokémon, football etc.)

World Book Day - Thursday 7th March 2024 – A message from Mrs Terry

World Book Day changes lives through a love of books and reading. At Manor Court, we will next be celebrating World Book Day on Thursday 7th March 2024. The mission for the day is to promote reading for pleasure, offering the opportunity for all pupils to be given a book of their own. Reading for pleasure is the single biggest indicator of a child's future success – more than their family circumstances, their parents' educational background or their income. We want to see more children with a life-long habit of reading for pleasure and the improved life chances this brings them.

This year, we are inviting pupils to come to school dressed as their favourite book character if they so wish, but we are mindful that dressing-up clothes can be expensive, so there is no need to buy anything new unless you choose to. There is also the option for pupils to wear their own comfy pyjamas to school, as we know a lot of our pupils enjoy reading at bedtime, their favourite everyday clothes, or they can wear their normal school uniform. The children may choose to bring in a prop from their favourite book, or just the book itself.



NSPCC workshops

This week we had the NSPCC in school to deliver their Speak out Stay safe programme to years 2, 5 and 6. This workshop helped children to understand that they always have a right to feel safe, and that they can speak to a safe adult or Childline if they ever need help or support. The programme covered topics like bullying and abuse in a child-friendly and age-appropriate way.

Careers information from Mrs Wilkins

As a school we are taking part in the 'Start Small; Dream Big' project; a free career-related learning programme for primary schools delivered by The Careers & Enterprise Company and backed by the Department for Education (DfE).

The programme holds huge importance for the future of careers education. It gives schools the opportunity to be part of an innovative national programme of activity and research, influencing and shaping future policy decisions on primary career-related learning. Through participation in this programme, career-related learning and skills development will become embedded into curriculum teaching, leading to an enhanced curriculum that will impact the learning outcomes for all.

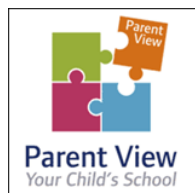


2024-2025 Term Dates

Bikeability

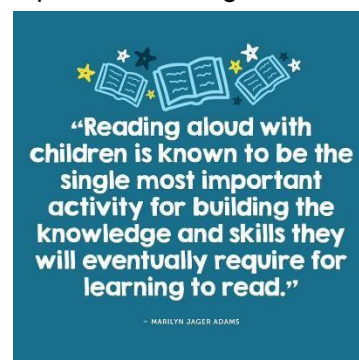
A number of our Y5 children have completed their bikeability course this week, and through practical learning and theory have learnt how to ride their bicycle safely on the road. This important course used to be called cycling proficiency and is an important life skill for each child to learn during their primary education.

Reading expectations – A message from Mrs Terry

At Manor Court Community Primary School, we seek to ensure that children are supported to be confident, lifelong learners with a love of reading. Reading plays a very important role in developing children culturally, emotionally, and socially and we believe literature plays a key role in such development. Reading enables pupils both to acquire knowledge and build on what they already know.

In school children in KS2 are heard reading on a 1:1 basis at least once a week by their class teacher and Learning Support staff and this is much more frequently in Foundation Stage and KS1. Those pupils not at an expected reading level are heard daily. The EYFS and Key Stage 1 reading books follow a clear progression of banding, ensuring fluency is developed. This academic year, you may find your child has a book sent home that they have already read at school, and this is something that is now promoted in all schools. The more a child reads, the larger their vocabulary becomes. When a child reads or hears the same book multiple times, they become familiar and comfortable with a greater number of words. Fluency is the ability to read text "accurately, quickly, and with expression."

Repetitive reading allows a child to read without stumbling or stopping, and reading time becomes more pleasant for everyone. Once a child masters one book, it makes moving on to another more appealing. Reading comprehension is the ability to understand all the components of a story — from plot to character development to symbolism. Comprehension is "the essence" of reading. Each time your child reads or hears a book read to them; they learn more about the story itself. Each pass through the text or illustrations allows them to dive into the story's meaning, preparing them for more complex narratives down the road. Children who progress from the banded scheme to 'free readers' can access their class library, and the school library, and can be supported to select appropriate books by staff. Pupils are encouraged to take home fiction and non-fiction texts. Children are expected to read at home 5 times a week, ideally daily, as this helps to develop confident and fluent readers. We would recommend 20 minutes of reading a day. Children's reading logs are checked to ensure this is taking place. Where children are not reading the required amount in school, they are invited to attend a lunchtime reading club. There is also opportunity to read to a member of staff at Homework Club and After-school Club.



Attendance our school expectations – A message from Miss Gregory

Pupil attendance and punctuality is a key focus and priority within our school. Individual attendance will be monitored and reviewed on a bi-weekly basis. We would like to kindly remind parents that the school's expectations on individual pupil attendance is 95% and above, with the aim of having 100% pupil attendance. Should your child fall behind the school's expectations a monitoring process is triggered, and we may ask you to come into school to

discuss your child's attendance with us. Should you have any questions or concerns relating to your child's attendance please do not hesitate to contact me within the school.

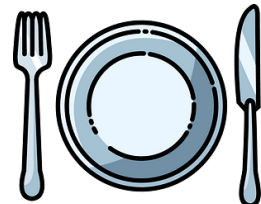

Remote learning in case of the need to close our school this winter

We are approaching the time of the year when the weather becomes more unsettled and schools may require closing because of poor weather, treacherous driving conditions or heating failures. If we do require to shut the school at any point, work packs are available for all children to complete at home (printed copies were sent home last week in the storms) and can be found in the year group specific page on our school website to be downloaded and printed at home. Measles and vaccination

Cases of measles are currently rising nationally. According to data from the UK Health Security Agency, there were 1,603 suspected cases in England and Wales in 2023, compared with 735 in 2022, 360 in 2021, and 695 in 2020.

Measles outbreaks happen when not enough children have been vaccinated. Measles can be a very serious disease, leading to ear and chest infections, fits, diarrhoea, and damage to the brain. Measles can kill.

The average number of children starting school having had both MMR doses has dropped to 85%. The World Health Organisation recommends that at least 95% of children be inoculated for diseases that can be stopped by vaccines.

Your child is therefore at risk of measles if he or she hasn't had the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccination.

Two doses of the MMR vaccine are needed to get the best protection.

If your child is due to have 2 doses of MMR but has not yet received them, no matter what age they are, you should contact your GP to get them vaccinated as soon as possible.

British Values Assemblies

Mr Talmage is leading a series of weekly Zoom assemblies each Monday about The British Values. Last week he discussed democracy and how we can make decisions as a school and as a country. We considered our right to vote on big decisions!

Wrap around care telephone number

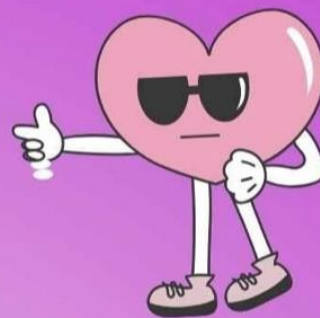
The telephone number for our wrap around care provision (breakfast & after school club) is **07471 412147** Please save this telephone number to your phone if you use wrap around care.
