### World Book Day - Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> March 2024

World Book Day was celebrated in style by the whole school last Thursday, 7<sup>th</sup> March. Thank you all for the efforts your children went to in terms of dressing-up; the outfits and pyjamas were brilliant! Mrs Terry led a whole school assembly about celebrating diversity and read a story involving the Mr Men and Little Miss characters. Every year group had the opportunity to take part in a character trail around the school and entered a book cover competition - winners will be chosen this Friday!



There was a lot of reading going on! Each year group read with a different year group, our youngest children had a special visitor who dressed up and read a story in Portuguese, our Year 3 and Year 6 pupils had special online Zoom meetings with children in an International School in France, and some children heard a story read in Japanese! Every class had a visit from an accountant too, who read a story. This linked to our career focus on maths this half term. The mission for the day was to promote reading for pleasure, offering the opportunity for all pupils to be given a book of their own. Every child took home a book voucher which can be exchanged for a £1.00 World Book Day book or used as money off a full-price book. Reading for pleasure is the single biggest indicator of a child's future success – more than their family circumstances, their parents' educational background or their income. We want to see more children with a life-long habit of reading for pleasure and the improved life chances this brings them. We feel our World Book Day activities and our Rock up and Read sessions have certainly helped towards this.



### Behaviour principles statement – A reminder from the local governing body.

We have all worked extremely hard to build a supportive community that we can be proud of and that lives up to its values to 'care, learn and achieve together'. Can we please remind each parent that any kind of violence, threatening behaviour, or abuse between children, or by parents, within the school community towards the school's staff both verbally (in person, or on the telephone) and via the written word, will not be tolerated.

If a parent does not conduct themselves properly, the school reserves the right to ban them from the school premises and, if the parent continues to cause disturbance, they may be liable to prosecution.

### Foundation Stage Mother's Day afternoon tea

Last Friday, Foundation Stage enjoyed hosting their Mother's Day Afternoon tea for their mum, grandma, or aunties. The children loved sharing their gifts, work, and biscuits that they had made with their special person. It was lovely to see so many guests in the school hall chatting together and enjoying the company of others.



### School Council Easter bonnet competition

The school council are holding a traditional Easter Bonnet competition again this year to raise funds for their charity of the year – The Little Princess Trust. If your child would like to enter, the deadline for handing your child's entry into their teacher is this Monday coming. There will be prizes and certificates for the winning bonnet's.



### Year 5 and 6 RAF Stem workshops

On Monday 4<sup>th</sup> March, the Year 5 and Year 6 children were excited to take part in an RAF stem workshop. The children showed teamwork and collaboration as they constructed robots, used coding to get the robots to move. The children had to work together to refine the design of their robots and to ensure that they moved as best as they could.

### **Pupil Voice Survey – A message from Mrs Terry**

We have recently completed a pupil voice survey of the children who attend our school and have sent the results home in a letter via ParentPay today. We asked each child (not the Foundation Stage children as we believed that they were too young) the same questions about their time at school and the education that is provided for them. We received 369 responses and believe that the positive responses are reflective of our school and the education that we provide for the children who attend Manor Court. The results included:

1. 98% of children said that they would recommend our school to a friend moving to the area.
2. 99% of children strongly agreed or agreed that Manor Court Community Primary School encourages me to respect people from other backgrounds and to treat everyone equally.
3. 92% of children asked stated that in every, or most lessons, my teacher gives them work that challenges me.

### **Easter Holiday Club - A message from Mr McCarten**

Our staff have been running paid for childcare of Manor Court children alongside holiday provision sponsored for FSM children by Healthy Happy Holidays. We will once more be offering this to all parents (not entitled to FSM) at a cost of £15 for a day, for the hours between 09:00 – 15:00 from Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> to Friday 5<sup>th</sup> April and Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup> to Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> April. This provision includes breakfast and a day of activities, including sports, baking and crafts. The week has been full of jelly, chicks, future farming and even making biodegradable plastics. The future is bright with our Manor Court scientists.



### **Somerset Science Festival – A message from Mr Staddon**

On Monday 6<sup>th</sup> May, some Year 5 pupils will be leading a stand at the Somerset Science Festival, to be held at Haynes Motor Museum. The pupils have been taking part in an after-school science club this term, led by myself and will be sharing their knowledge and understanding of science with a focus on sustainability.

The day will be a perfect opportunity for children and adults alike to learn about science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) and explore the various STEM-based careers and industries that are available in Somerset. Last year, over 4800 people attended the festival. Visitors had the chance to take part in exciting hands-on activities, watch live demonstrations and discover inspiring projects. 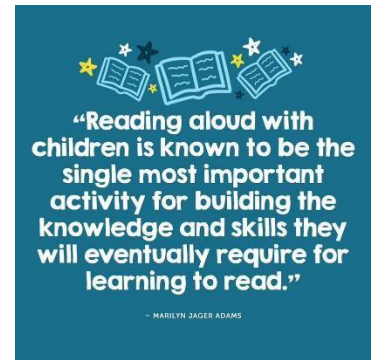

## Reading expectations – A message from Mrs Terry

At Manor Court Community Primary School, we seek to ensure that children are supported to be confident, lifelong learners with a love of reading. Reading plays a very important role in developing children culturally, emotionally, and socially and we believe literature plays a key role in such development. Reading enables pupils both to acquire knowledge and build on what they already know.

In school children in KS2 are heard reading on a 1:1 basis at least once a week by their class teacher and Learning Support staff and this is much more frequently in Foundation Stage and KS1. Those pupils not at an expected reading level are heard daily. The EYFS and Key Stage 1 reading books follow a clear progression of banding, ensuring fluency is developed. This academic year, you may find your child has a book sent home that they have already read at school, and this is something that is now promoted in all schools. The more a child reads, the larger their vocabulary becomes. When a child reads or hears the same book multiple times, they become familiar and comfortable with a greater number of words. Fluency is the ability to read text “accurately, quickly, and with expression.”

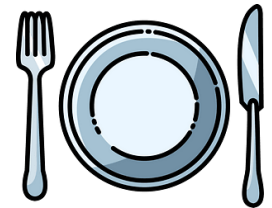
Repetitive reading allows a child to read without stumbling or stopping, and reading time becomes more pleasant for everyone. Once a child masters one book, it makes moving on to another more appealing. Reading comprehension is the ability to understand all the components of a story — from plot to character development to symbolism. Comprehension is “the essence” of reading. Each time your child reads or hears a book read to them; they learn more about the story itself. Each pass through the text or illustrations allows them to dive into the story’s meaning, preparing them for more complex narratives down the road. Children who progress from the banded scheme to ‘free readers’ can access their class library, and the school library, and can be supported to select appropriate books by staff. Pupils are encouraged to take home fiction and non-fiction texts. Children are expected to read at home 5 times a week, ideally daily, as this helps to develop confident and fluent readers. We would recommend 20 minutes of reading a day. Children’s reading logs are checked to ensure this is taking place. Where children are not reading the required amount in school, they are invited to attend a lunchtime reading club. There is also opportunity to read to a member of staff at Homework Club and After-school Club.



## Hot meals parental feedback – A message from Mrs Hunt

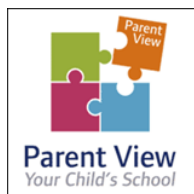

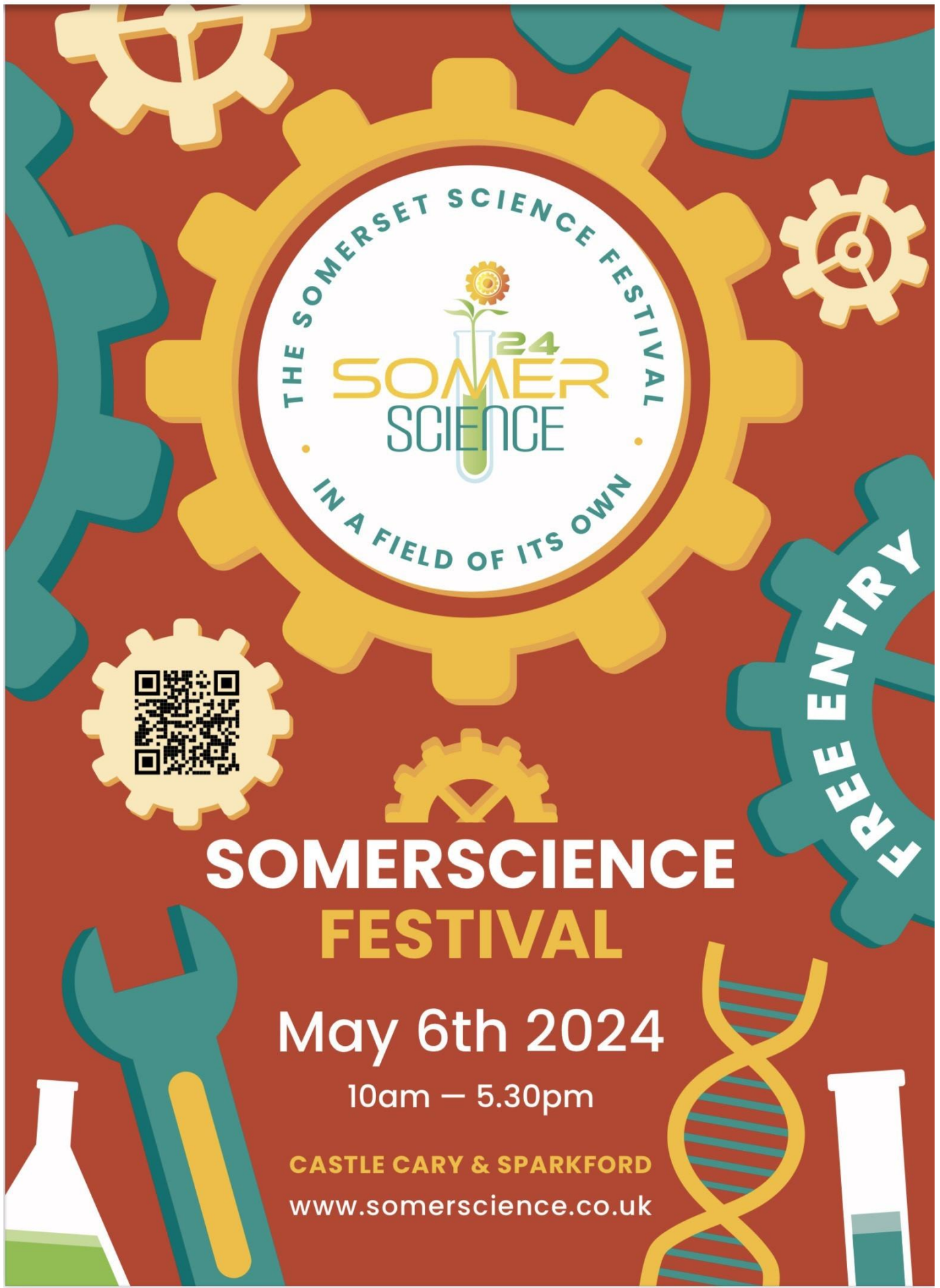
## Ofsted Parent view

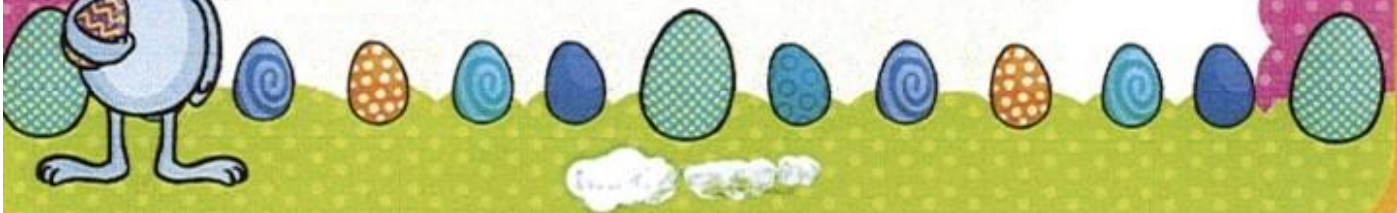
